FAIRVALE'S 50TH ANNIVERSARY

1969 – 2019 Fairvale High School 1968 first form (Year 7) pupils were accepted into the first enrolment. There were 158 pupils initially attending

Holroyd High School in 1968 until the Fairvale High School site was completed for the start of 1st form and 2nd form, 1969.

Debra Anderson was the first pupil on the Register of Admissions for 1968 (written in alphabetical order of surnames). The last pupil registered in 1968 was Kevin Maher. Of the 184 pupils who were enrolled in 1968, 25 completed Year 12 in 1973. The majority of pupils left in Year 10 to commence work.



THE RISE OF THE BINI



An extraordinary building has literally risen from the ground at Fairvale to become, towards the and Assembly Hall. Called a Bini Shell, after its designer, it is the second of its size to be built in Sydney being 36 metres in diameter and 12 metres high. The



concrete was poured on reinforcements (which had balloon underneath) over a period end of next year, our Gymnasium of 3 hours and a cover was placed over the concrete. The compressors then started to pump air at about 9.45a.m. on Tuesday, 15th October, and an hour later the pumping was complete.























PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

This year is the 50th Anniversary for Fairvale High School. From land that was originally used for market gardens, we now have a vibrant and thriving suburb called Fairfield West which has seen much progress and development over the last five decades.

In 1968, 158 First Form (Year 7) students were enrolled and commenced their education at Holroyd High School. Their local school known as Fairvale was finally completed at the end of 1968 and fitted out with Art, Crafts, Music, Science rooms, a Library, Ancillary rooms, Canteen facilities, a shelter area, toilets and change rooms were completed. The teaching staff numbered 20 and increased to 30 in 1970. This is in sharp contrast to the 170 staff that Fairvale High has today in 2019. In Form 1 students studied English, Mathematics, Science, Art or Craft, Music, Physical Education, Health, Guidance and Religious Instruction, History, Geography and elective subjects were German, Commerce, Woodwork, Technical Drawing, Home Science and Needlework. This is similar to courses offered today with the added bonus of Information and Communication Technology courses.

Some of the matters that the founding Principal, Mr Raymond Mowbray, lamented about in his annual address are the same issues that concern Principals today. These are the issues of lateness, non-attendance, watching too much television (screen time in today's language), not reading widely and minimal application to one's studies and homework. Whilst the years have flown by it is apparent that even today the challenges of the teenage years are still ever present. It is, on the other hand, heartening to see the growth individually in students, as they progress from Year 7 to becoming mature young men and women when they leave at the end of Year 12.

On this note, I would like to take the opportunity to remind the current 2019 Year 12, to look after themselves with regular exercise, sleep and healthy eating in preparation for their Higher School Certificate examinations in mid-October. I wish Year 12 all the best in their studies and trust that each one of you do your best as you complete your thirteen years of schooling. Whatever post-school pathway you choose, the staff of Fairvale High and I wish you much success and hope that we will hear of your positive and productive endeavours in the future.

Term 4 begins for all students on Monday 14 October and we move to our summer uniform, meaning no ties and the wearing of school jackets only in wet weather.

To all our Fairvale families - have a wonderful and safe Spring holiday and thank you for your ongoing support of Fairvale High School.

FLOREY BLOCK

Howard Walter Florey, Baron Florey, OM, FRS, FRCP (24 September 1898 - 21 February 1968) was an Australian pharmacologist and pathologist who shared the Nobel Prize in Physiology or Medicine in 1945 with Sir Ernst Chain and Sir Alexander Fleming for his role in the development of penicillin.



GREENWAY BLOCK

Francis Howard Greenway (20 November 1777 - September 1837) was an English-born architect who was transported to Australia as a convict for the crime of forgery. In New South Wales he worked for the Governor, Lachlan Macquarie, as Australia's first government architect. He became widely known and admired for his work displayed in buildings such as St Matthew's Church in Windsor, New South Wales, St James' Church, Sydney and Hyde Park Barracks, Sydney.



NEWLING BLOCK

Cecil Bede Newling (1883 - 1975) was an educationist. In March 1919 Newling had enrolled as an evening student at the University of Sydney; he twice graduated with first-class honours in history: B.A. with the Wood prize and University medal in 1923 and, after winning the Venour Nathan prize, M.A. 1925 the crowning point for Cecil Newling was his appointment as foundation principal of Teachers' College, Armidale, on 1 February 1928




WRIGHT BLOCK

Judith Arundell Wright (31 May 1915 - 25 June 2000) was an Australian poet, environmentalist and campaigner for Aboriginal land rights. Wright studied Philosophy, English, Psychology and History at the University of Sydney. Wright's first book of poetry, The Moving Image, was published in 1946; and in 1966 The Nature of Love, her first collection of short stories was published. Wright was nominated for the 1967 Nobel

Prize for Literature.


SCHOOL DISCO
