FAIRVALE HIGH SCHOOL - AMBASSADOR SCHOOL



At Fairvale High School, the most popular after-school activity for Year 10 students is the Algebra Club. It is entirely voluntary and involves an age group that can be difficult to get out of bed, let alone go to an extra maths class. Yet around 50 students attend each session, thanks to a school-wide culture of constantly striving for improvement.

“The word we use is relentless,” said Head Maths teacher Steve Barbuto.

“It never stops. Day in, day out, we’re writing something for someone, fixing something up here, fixing something up there. We’ve been doing this for 10 years now, it’s become cultural.

”Fairvale High leads the state in improving its students’ literacy, numeracy and attendance, so has been named one of the public system’s first ambassador schools, alongside Auburn North Public and Millthorpe Public.

“[They are] statistical outliers, who had performed really well compared with similar schools, that’s what made them stand out,” said NSW Education Minister Sarah Mitchell. “These schools have the X factor. It’s about capturing what it is that makes those schools so successful, then trying to scale that across the system.”

Investing in our schools

The NSW Government is investing \$7 billion over the next four years, continuing its program to deliver more than 200 new and upgraded schools to support communities across NSW. This is the largest investment in public education infrastructure in the history of NSW.

The NSW Department of Education is committed to delivering new and upgraded schools for communities across NSW. The delivery of these important projects is essential to the future learning needs of our students and supports growth in the local economy.

Project overview

A project is underway to upgrade Fairvale High School. The project will increase the school's capacity and includes:

- 30 permanent teaching spaces including specialised classrooms for science, technology and food technology (Block K)
- new multipurpose hall including gym facilities, stage and canteen (Block J)
- improved outdoor play space, including a new covered outdoor learning area (COLA)
- new and expanded staff administration facilities

Progress summary

Work on the school upgrade is progressing well.

The building structure for the new two storey multipurpose hall (Block J) is complete, and internal fit-out is underway. The new hall will include multipurpose sports courts, a raised stage, student amenities and storage rooms, canteen, specialised PDHPE classrooms, fitness lab and seminar room.

The building structure for the permanent teaching spaces (Block K) has been completed. Internal fit-out is underway, with painting and joinery installation in progress.

Next steps

- Continue with internal fit out of levels GF, 1 and 2 (Block K). This includes the new administration area, classrooms and toilet blocks.
- Continue with the internal fit-out to Block J.

The project is anticipated to be completed late 2021.




CONSTRUCTION - BY OUR VERY OWN STUDENTS

On Wednesday 2 June 2021, Mr Atkins and Mr Narayan's Year 12 VET Construction students, participated in a concreting project at Fairvale High School. The students learned to safely install formwork, reinforcement, place and finish concrete for the construction of minor slabs and pathways for two footpaths near the Trade Training Centre.

On the day, both classes worked well and were enthusiastic in completing their assigned duties. Skills demonstrated were of industry standard. The practical work component of the task was completed at the school site with appropriate signage and exclusion zones maintained, and correct PPE was worn. They overcame a minor inconveniences as the concrete truck was late, and had to mix the last section of concrete manually - using a wheelbarrow and shovel. The mishaps didn't dampen their enthusiasm and the footpaths were completed successfully. Students learned skills in the use of concreting tools, equipment, materials and simple forms, which include working with other members of the team.



FAIRVALE'S SUSTAINABILITY TEAM

The Sustainability team at Fairvale High School have arranged for a Mobile Muster collection box for any old mobiles, chargers and mobile batteries.

The collection box is situated in the Careers Room in Wright Block.

When you drop your old mobile phones for recycling they are collected and transported to Mobile Muster recycling facilities in Australia. They are sorted and disassembled into components

including batteries, printed circuit boards, casings, glass screens, accessories and packaging.

These components are further processed separately through shredding and sorting techniques to maximise resource recovery.

The health effects of tobacco smoking and e-cigarette use

Effect of tobacco smoking on your health:

- Smoking is the main cause of **preventable** death and disease in Australia!
- Smoking is linked to **40+ diseases**, including lung cancer, liver cancer, emphysema and eye and mouth diseases.
- When you smoke, extremely harmful chemicals enter your body and can reach your heart, brain and go everywhere your blood flows.
- Smoking affects how you look and feel.

Effects of e-cigarette use on your health:

- E-cigarettes contain chemicals that **haven't been tested for safety** when inhaled into the lungs.
- E-cigarette makers don't list all their ingredients and it can be hard to find out what they are. Some e-cigarettes contain nicotine even when they are labelled "nicotine free".
- Nicotine is **highly addictive** and can harm your brain development.
- Studies have shown that young people who use e-cigarettes are **more likely to smoke** and become addicted to cigarettes in adulthood.

Smoking can:

- Stop your lungs growing properly and make you less fit.
- Give you tooth decay and sore or bleeding gums.
- Make you wheeze or trigger an asthma attack.
- Cause addiction to the drug nicotine.

Using e-cigarettes can:

- Make you wheeze or trigger an asthma attack.
- Make you moody, anxious and irritable.
- Expose your lungs, body and brain to harmful chemicals.
- Cause addiction to the drug nicotine.

Smoking and e-cigarettes affect your brain:

Your brain is particularly sensitive to the effects of nicotine. Your brain is still developing until you are about 25 years old, so if you use nicotine your brain may not be able to properly develop. This means that you are more likely to develop anxiety and mood disorders.

What does all this mean for you?

Smoking or using e-cigarettes:

- is bad for the health of your body, lungs and brain
- costs a lot of money and can mean you miss out on doing fun activities
- exposes you to addictive and unknown substances
- gives you yellow teeth and unhealthy gums.

**By choosing not to smoke or use e-cigarettes you are setting yourself up
for a healthier and happier life!**
