We are excited to announce, Fairvale High School is transitioning to an upgraded Finance System, School Bytes, as of Term 1, 2024.

School Bytes provides a parent/carer portal to help us communicate with you.

The School Bytes portal provides flexibility for parents/carers to conveniently:

- Make school payments online (including multiple siblings at once)
- Download a receipt for payments made
- View all historical payments in one place
- View, complete and submit digital permission notes

Online payments are processed in real-time and can be viewed by school staff immediately.

The School Bytes Parent Portal also enables you to view the profiles of all your children in one section and process payments for multiple siblings in one transaction.

Please note all previous payments made will be migrated to the new School Bytes system and portal.


SCHOOL BYTES REGISTRATION INSTRUCTIONS:



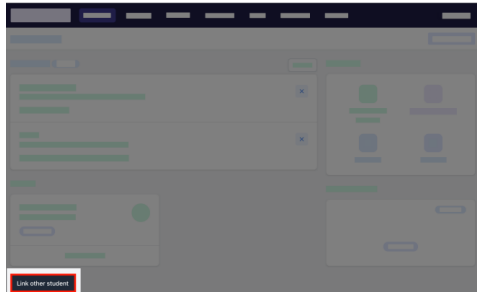

An email will be sent to the email address nominated so that you can verify your access to the email address. Once you have created your account, log in to the School Bytes parent portal. You can now link your account to all students in schools that use the School Bytes platform. When linking a student, the system automatically matches the data you provided with details stored on the student's school profile.

Linking Student to School Bytes Account

1. Select link other student.
2. Search for the school's name.
3. Enter the student's first name.
4. Enter the student's last name.
5. Select the student's current grade.
6. Enter the student's date of birth.
7. Select search.



If all student information matches with parent information according to the student's official enrolment stored at the school, the system will add the student to the parent account automatically.

Mentoring sessions are held in the library at lunchtimes.

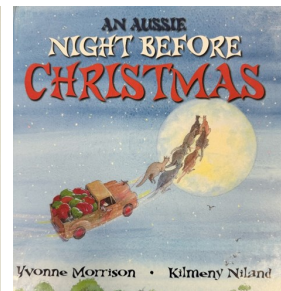
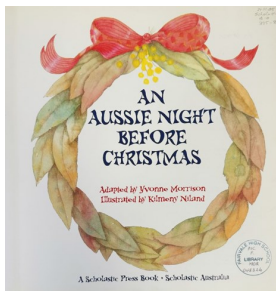

PHOTOGRAPHY CLUB

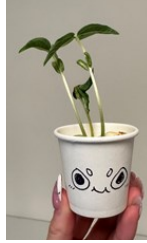

YEAR 8 SCIENCE

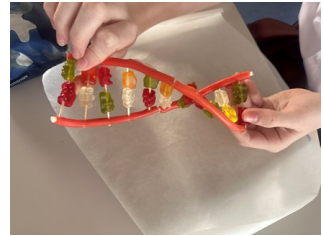

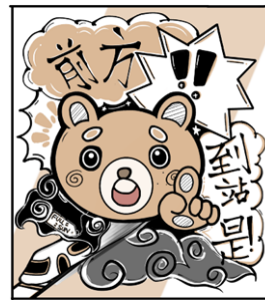

Alison's artwork "The profound cognitive effects of looking up" will be exhibited at the Art Gallery of NSW in 2024.

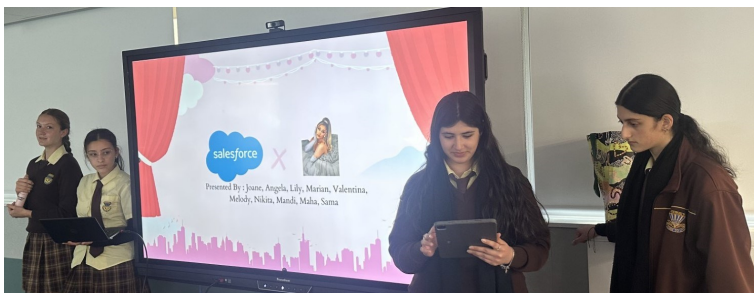


VET SUMMIT & VIRTUAL WORKPLACEMENT

SCHOOL UNIFORM - SHOES AND SOCKS

It is important that parents and carers provide students with the correct school uniform elements through out the students school years. Below is a friendly reminder of the types of socks and school shoes Fairvale students need to wear to school on a daily basis.

SOCKS: **Boys** must wear GREY fold down ankle



Girls must wear white fold down ankle socks or chocolate brown tights.



SHOES:

All students need to wear school shoes. School shoes must be plain laced leather enclosed shoes.

Slipper style shoes, sports style shoes and sports shoes are banned for safety reasons. Boots or shoes with steel caps are also not allowed. Students can attend Time to Shine on Fridays during the first half of lunch to polish their shoes in Wright Block, and are reminded to polish their school shoes on a regular basis.

Girls need to wear brown plain laced leather school shoes.
