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SOCIAL MEDIA USAGE

Dear parents and carers

We are writing to inform you about the growing concerns regarding the inappropriate use of social media by students. As technology becomes an integral part of their daily lives, it is crucial for us, as parents and educators, to ensure their online activities are safe and appropriate. There can be inappropriate use of technology such as smart phones, iPads, laptops, and other computers.

Under the age of 13 children should not be using or have access to social media Apps such as Facebook, Snapchat, TikTok and Instagram (to mention just a few).

There have been instances of children and teenagers using social media apps to learn about, engage with, and transmit offensive content. This may include sharing inappropriate language, images and being exposed to harmful content. Such activities not only affect their wellbeing but also the wellbeing of their peers.

To help mitigate these risks, we strongly urge you to take the following actions:

Regular Monitoring: Please regularly monitor your child's device usage. Check the apps they are using, the content they are engaging with, and the people they are interacting with online.

Open Communication: Have open and honest conversations with your child about the appropriate use of social media. Educate them on the potential dangers and the importance of responsible online behaviour.

Set Boundaries: Establish clear rules and guidelines for internet use. This can include setting time limits, restricting access to certain apps or websites, and ensuring devices are used in common areas of the home.

Parental Controls: Utilise parental control features available on devices and apps to help manage and monitor your child's online activities.

Stay Informed: Keep yourself informed about the latest social media trends and the potential risks associated with them. This will enable you to better guide and protect your child.

INVESTIGATING SCIENCE - AUSTRALIAN MUSEUM







Year 11 Investigating Science and Ms Yap had the opportunity to visit the Australian Museum. They were able to explore different exhibitions to broaden their knowledge on the past and how it has shaped society today.

Some of the exhibits of focus were the minerals found within the Earth, animal adaptations and the effects of climate change.

Other exhibits provided insight into the First Nations People's thoughts on sustainability, ancient tools, weapons, other inventions and discoveries.

It was an eventful day and great experience for the Investigating Science students.

YEAR 10 SCIENCE - CHEMICAL REACTIONS



Year 10 Science has been learning about Chemistry and in particular, the variety of chemical reactions that exist. 10B and Miss Nguyen performed a wonderful precipitation investigation where students mixed two clear liquids to see if a solid (called a precipitate) would form.

This helped the students understand that some substances react to make new materials that do not dissolve in water.

It was a hands-on way to learn about chemical changes and how we can predict them.

YEAR 12 - EARTH AND ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCE

Year 12 Earth and Environmental Science have been studying how natural disasters such as earthquakes, volcanic activity and cyclones have a significant impact on the Earth's environment, causing enormous damage.

The students have also explored how and to what extent, technologies can be used to predict hazardous events and reduce their effects. One way is the creation of earthquake-proof buildings, which Miss Nguyen and her class have successfully modelled in class.





YEAR 8 - TALENT QUEST PREPARATIONS

Some of our Year 8 High Potential and Gifted music students are working diligently in an extracurricular band program every Monday after school.

Guided by Mr. Thwaites and supported by Year 12 HSC Music mentors Miguel and Alysha, these students are preparing for a performance at the upcoming Talent Quest. The students are showing remarkable growth and enthusiasm.

This collaborative effort highlights the power of mentorship and dedication, setting the stage for a fantastic showcase of their talents.



YEAR 12 - HSC PIANO WORKSHOP WITH JOSHUA HAN



On Wednesday 28 May, our J Block Hall hosted a special workshop for our Year 12 HSC Music students, featuring guest artist Joshua Han. Originally planned as a formal concert, the event was adapted into an open, one-on-one rehearsal format. This change allowed students to work closely with Joshua in front of an audience of family, friends, and teachers.

At age 22, Joshua is one of Australia's most accomplished young pianists. He recently won 1st Prize at the 2024 Australian National Piano Award. Earlier this year, he also won 1st Prize at the 2025 International J.S. Bach Piano Competition in Germany and 2nd Prize at the 2024 Lev Vlassenko Piano Competition, where he was also awarded the Concerto Prize and Queensland Symphony Orchestra Musicians' Choice Award for his performance of Rachmaninov's Rhapsody on a Theme of Paganini.

During the workshop, each of our eight HSC students performed their exam repertoire and received individual feedback from Joshua. His comments on interpretation, tone production, and stage presence were insightful and supportive, giving students clear direction as they prepare for their upcoming practical exams.

The afternoon concluded with a 30-minute solo performance from Joshua, giving the audience the chance to hear an award-winning pianist perform works from his current recital program.

DRAGON AND WARRIORS ON MULTICULTURAL DAY



On Multicultural Day, a group of students put on a spectacular performance supported by Ms Chen, Ms Kenney and Ms Le. The performance was made possible by a hardworking team of students who worked behind the scenes as script writers, video editors, and assistants, as well as students who shone on stage as dragon bearers, warriors, and dancers.

It allowed students from various cultural backgrounds to work together and create a performance that had elements of both traditional and contemporary culture. 
