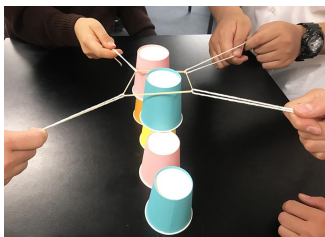
Any student, who in past years has achieved a top award, will continue at that level. They will need to check with their Year Advisors about this.

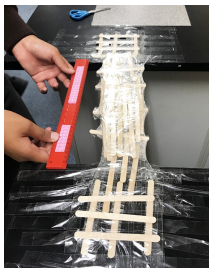

"Since we did the hike on school days, we were able to recover on the weekend."

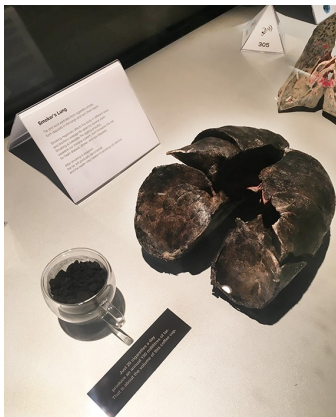

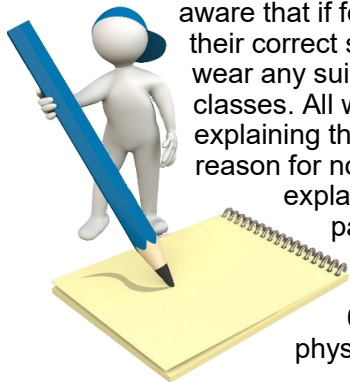

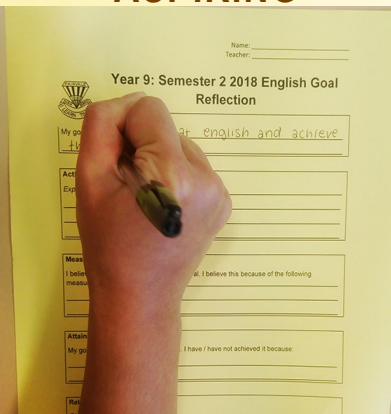

SUN SAFETY - Our school takes sun safety seriously and we implement a range of strategies to support students from the damaging effects of the sun. However, what are you doing to protect yourself?



Much of the sun exposure that causes skin damage occurs in childhood and adolescence.

By the age of 15 many children have developed irreversible skin damage from exposure to the sun. While skin cancer is the most common cancer in Australia, it is estimated that 95% of skin cancers can be prevented through reducing exposure to ultraviolet radiation from the sun.

Effective sun safety involves the school community working together.

Who can help and how?

Fairvale High School

- Provides shade at recess and lunch time for students to participate in physical activity whilst sheltering them from the sun during peak UVR times (e.g. undercover basketball courts).
- Encourage students to wear FVHS uniform hats during PE, Sport and at break times.
- Provide sunscreen in the PE staffroom for students if they forget to bring their own to school.
- Staff always model appropriate sun safety practices including all PDHPE teachers wearing sunscreen, sunglasses, hats and collared shirts during practical lessons.
- Educates students during Health lessons about the potential dangers of over exposure to the sun.

Remember, encouraging children and young people to practise sun safety is a shared responsibility.

Whether at school, in the backyard or on the beach, children and young people should wear a sun safe hat and sunscreen.

By practising sun safety at home, parents and caregivers support the messages taught at school about sun safety.

Children and young people will come to appreciate the importance of sun protection not only during their schooling, but also throughout their life.

Students can

- Wear FVHS uniform hats
- Seek shade during peak UVR times during the school day
- Wear SPF 500+ sunscreen.

Parents can

- Ensure that students pack their FVHS hat each day
- Ensure students have sunscreen in their school bag and monitor the remaining levels
- Model appropriate sun safety practices at home
- Discuss important sun safety issue with their children at home

ARRIVE TO SCHOOL EARLY - LATENESS IS UNACCEPTABLE**

Fairvale High School communicates the issue of attendance and punctuality via the following:-

- Daily SMS text messages to parents/carers
- Phone calls to parents/carers
- Parent meetings
- Notification of Attendance Concern letters
- Student Monitoring books



Parents must ensure their children attend school every day. It is important to tell the school if your child has to be absent from school and to provide a reason for the absence.

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school.

Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- being sick or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment

Parents must provide an explanation for absences to the school within 7 days of the absence.

Fairvale High's first bell rings at 8.40am; all students need to be at roll call by 8.43am when the second bell rings.

It is expected that students arrive to school by 8:30am to allow for any unexpected delays.

School attendance rolls are marked at roll call at the start of each school day (8:40am).

If a student is late without a valid reason, they will be required to report to Lunch 1 detention on each day they arrive late to school.

If a student fails to report to the lunch 1 detention on the day they had arrived late, parents will be notified in writing or by a telephone call that their child will be required to report to after school detention on Thursday from 3:04 – 4:00pm.
