UTS SUMMER SCHOOL

For two weeks in January 2019, UTS provided 200 persistent and diligent Year 11 students from partnered schools, the opportunity to attend a summer school program called U@Uni. This program aimed to increment enthusiasm for HSC studies and beyond, demystify university and develop student confidence allowing for interpersonal skills and personal aspirations to be built. Students were given the choice of six subject areas - media and communication, business, engineering and information technology, design, health and creative intelligence.

At the Business school, our agenda was focused on "The Future of Work." This allowed us to acquire information on how and why work will change but also what skills we would require as individuals to effectively adapt to this alteration. We discussed this point vigorously for the two weeks and it included: developing companies and pitches to present for the class, going on excursions to observe business archetypes, programing Sphero Robots and being immersed in the culture of the university. We learnt about the various business majors we could study after school, such as marketing, accounting and event management as well as potential career paths that could be pursued with those degrees. Excursions included a scavenger hunt at the Powerhouse Museum, in order to investigate the advantage of innovation. We were also given the opportunity to visit the Bulldogs training ground to better understand the range of behind the scenes, business related jobs that make sporting

clubs so successful. Communication, team work and other valuable skills were further developed throughout the program as we had to work with new people to complete challenges that could not be done alone. We developed genuine friendships with many of our peers and mentors. Apart from the academic aspects of the experience, it was amazing to explore the university and witness the dedication displayed by staff and students alike. To say the very least, it was a rewarding two weeks with UTS!

On the final day, a graduation was held to commemorate students for their hard work and dedication. Friends and family were invited to view displayed projects students had worked arduously on and to celebrate the accomplishments of each individual student. UTS SUMMER SCHOOL



The UTS Summer School was a great experience for us. During the program, we were given the opportunity to participate in a variety of engineering and IT based activities. It gave us the opportunity to work with students from partnered schools across NSW allowing us to broaden our communication skills and form new friendship. During the first week, our main activities were based on three main categories – robotics, IT & gaming and civil engineering. We participated in

activities such as constructing a spaghetti-straw bridge, coding our own game, programing an EV3 robot. Overall it was a humbling and memorable experience for us. I can highly recommend this program.

I was in the Design area for the UTS Summer school and our theme was sustainability.

We were split into four groups with different subject of design - product design, architecture, visual communications and textiles. I chose product design. Mentors for the two weeks introduced themselves we talked little of what is product design then we created a sketch of the product depending on the prompts we were given after we created a practice 3D model of the sketch product we chosen and then later build a real 3D model in the end. Early on in the first week, we were also introduced to visual communications including animation. We chose a haiku to create a mini book which we drew and later on used ink to write the words, textures and outline the sketch.

We were also introduced to architecture and we moved outside to the courtyard and had to write the atmosphere, materials and structures then we drew map diagram of the courtyard. Then we use tracing paper on the photos we took to recreate the courtyard to something new and then we had to build a 3D model. On another day we used textiles to create clothes and add some drawings.

I chose visual communication as my area of focus for the program because I wanted to learn about animation. We were required to do a stop motion animation with the theme of sustainability, remaking a old animation of captain planet.

We started off making concept art of the characters and having group discussions to add changes. We then made models of the characters, props, background and effects then we started to move the characters and take pictures to add movement. It was a great process to see from the initial drawings to the final animation.



SCHOOL UNIFORM - SOCKS AND SHOES

It is important that parents and carers provide students with the correct school uniform elements through out the students school years. Below is a friendly reminder of the types of socks and school shoes Fairvale students need to wear to school on a daily basis.

SOCKS: Boys must wear GREY fold down ankle socks. White and black socks are no longer allowed to be worn.

Girls must wear white fold down ankle socks or chocolate brown tights.





SHOES:

All students need to wear school shoes. School shoes must be plain laced leather enclosed shoes.

Girls need to wear brown plain laced leather school shoes.



Boys need to wear black plain laced leather school shoes



Slipper style shoes are banned for safety reasons and sports style shoes and sports shoes are not acceptable. Boots or shoes with steel caps are not allowed











Students are also reminded to polish their school shoes on a regular basis. This shows pride in appearance and also helps to protect the leather, helps to keep the shoes waterproof and makes the shoes last longer.

- Make sure your parents or another adult you know is aware of where you are at all times. Always walk straight home or to the required destination. Walk near busier roads and streets, or use paths where there are a lot of other people.
- Know where safe places are a shop, service station, police station, library or school. If you are frightened, you should go to one of these places and ask them to call the police.
- Learn about safe adults you can look for and talk to if you need help police officers, teachers at school, adults you know and trust.
- Don't talk to people you don't know and never get into a car with someone you don't know. If a car stops on the side of the road and you don't know the person inside, do not stop.
- If you are scared and can use a phone, call Triple Zero (000) and tell them you are scared.
- If someone tries to grab you, yell out, 'Go away, I don't know you!' This
 lets other people know you have been approached by someone you
 don't know.

Be mindful that police will treat the matter as serious and may proactively release information to the public via police media.






